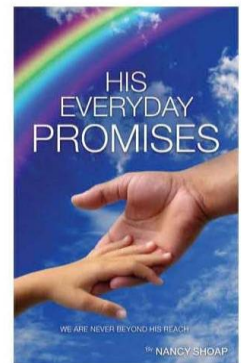

Daffodil Sales Report



In 2012 Perry Valley Grange raised \$1,852 during the sale to help the American Cancer Society fund research, educate the public and provide patient services.

For almost more years than anyone can remember, our Grange has taken an active role to support the American Cancer Society by selling daffodils – *the flower of hope* – each March in Millerstown and Liverpool.

Perry Valley's sales in 2012 represented an increase of \$306 over the previous year. A summary of this year's sales: 96 bunches of flowers, 56 potted mini-daffodils, 3 "Vases & a Bunch" and 6 "Bears & a Bunch".

In March Perry Valley distributed dictionaries purchased by the Pomona Grange to third grade students at Greenwood Elementary School as part of the "Words for Thirds" project. This is a program undertaken by Granges all across the nation to present third grade students with a personal dictionary to help with their spelling and reading comprehension.

Books for Kids



Our Grange is providing \$500 to purchase books for distribution in two local summer reading programs.

In the Greenwood School District students who receive summer tutoring to improve their reading ability will be given paperback books of their own. Newport area children who participate in the public library's summer reading program will also get a book courtesy of Perry Valley Grange.

High School Awards



Continuing our long standing commitment to helping students, Perry Valley Grange will give four awards this spring to local graduates of Newport and Greenwood High Schools. In each school a \$100 cash award will be given to recognize:

- **Outstanding vocational-technical graduates**
- **Outstanding FFA students**

Essay & Poster Contest Big Hit at Elementary Schools

A record number of entries – 76 posters and 114 essays - competed this year in the Grange sponsored essay & poster contest in Greenwood and Newport Elementary Schools. The project is one of our biggest annual community service projects.

The theme for both contests in 2012 was **“A Handicap Will Not Limit Me”**. Student participants were encouraged to use their imagination to describe in their essay or show in a poster how the physically handicapped can live and active and productive life despite their special challenge(s). The 190 total entries this year far exceeded any previous years (128 in 2011). The Grange provided cash awards of \$50 - first place, \$30 - second and \$20 - third in each contest in each school (total of \$400).



An awards assembly was held in each school on Wednesday, March 28, 2012. An important part of the assembly is always an education presentation related to the year’s contest theme. Ms. Janeen Latin (above) of United Cerebral Palsy (UCP) Central Pennsylvania, Camp Hill, showed students a variety of devices that allow people with disabilities to perform daily living activities independently. Tools to turn knobs, large numbers on a telephone keypad, a braille book, and a computer keyboard for one hand were among the items.

In Loving Memory.....Sister **Linda Wingert**, a member since 1970, passed away very suddenly this winter. A Grange service was conducted at her viewing and the charter will be draped in her memory at our May 11th meeting.

Great Job! We've had a busy spring at the Grange with quite a few banquets and the help of all volunteers is much appreciated. The public Ham & Dandelion Dinner was particularly successful and realized a profit of about \$1,800.

Oh, Really! That's Too Bad!

Lately I've heard this quite often. Word is getting out that the Grange is considering the sale of its property. Whether I'm talking to some of our "less active" members, guests at events held in the Grange Hall or just people around the community, people seem to know what's going on and respond with this comment. Many express surprise that such an established and much respected organization would be thinking about selling a highly visible and well equipped building.

That's my cue to talk about how much the Grange regrets the necessity of this action but the reality is that we don't have enough people willing to give enough time and labor to continue things in the ways we've been accustomed to and take for granted. When I say we need more people to take an active part in the Grange and issue the invitation to become a member, almost always the response is "Sorry, but I don't have time."

The next comment I usually hear is "But.....you can't sell the Grange." It's almost as if the person(s) to whom I'm speaking haven't heard what I've been saying about the need for more people and more dedication.

Now frankly, I harbored the secret hope that talking about such a drastic downsizing as selling the Grange Hall would generate more interest in the community and that existing members would be jolted out of their complacency. A few people have stepped up to do more but their efforts have barely helped to maintain the status quo considering those who have died, are no longer physically able or plain just don't care to help.

So...we are forced to continue looking into various options that include a possible disposition of our property. Our Grange's very generous offer to deed the property to the State Grange for use as a state headquarters was turned down with nothing more than short refusal letter from the State Master – no phone calls, no discussion, no explanation and no support.

The Executive Committee has interviewed three realtors and two are willing to list our property for commercial sale. The reality is that any sale will certainly generate much less than the assessed value of or our investment in the property over the years. Right now we are about to meet with a local church that has expressed some preliminary interest in our site as a possible location for their growing ministry.

Two things are very clear:

- ***Even under the best of circumstances, it will likely be many months or a year until any sale can be finalized so fund raising activities and the responsibilities of maintaining our property must continue.***
- ***The really important thing about the Grange is not a building, but rather about the relationships we nurture among people within the Grange. As long as we care about each other, the Grange will continue.***

If we stop caring for our relationships with one another, then the future is unpleasantly clear.....and we're likely to hear again "Oh, Really! That's Too Bad!"

Charity Raffle Announced

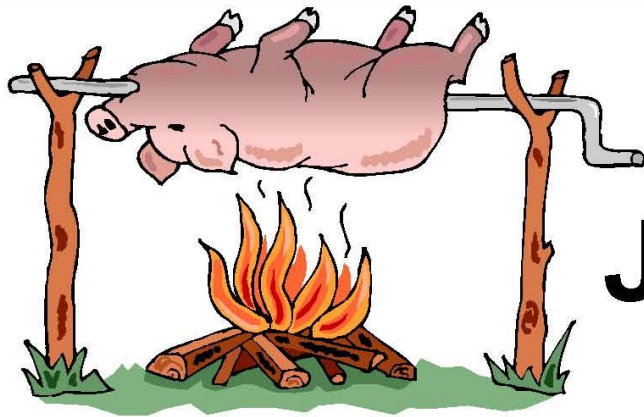

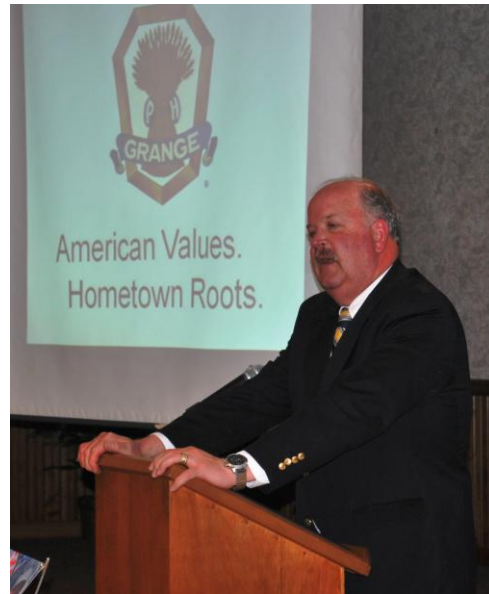
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Our Grange Ideals
